Re: **Maricopa County Attorney's Office Deferred Prosecution Program Annual Report, 2014-15**

Dear Ms. Ortiz:

Pursuant to Arizona Revised Statutes §11-362, I am sending you a copy of the Annual Evaluation (July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015) of the Maricopa County Attorney's Office (MCAO) Diversion Programs.

Treatment Assessment Screening Center, Inc. (TASC) Diversion

The TASC program is intended for possessors of controlled substances and is available as a charging alternative (pre-filing) and after charging as an alternative to prosecution (post-filing). People who successfully complete the program and pay the assigned fees can avoid criminal charges being filed against them or can have filed charges dismissed with prejudice. Both options require the offender to meet general TASC eligibility criteria. TASC is a privately-owned and operated organization that designs and monitors this diversion program in cooperation with the MCAO.

Possession of Marijuana (POM) is the most commonly referred drug offense; 84% of those referred for POM successfully completed TASC.

Support Group referrals (Alcoholics Anonymous, Cocaine Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, etc.) were made to 62% of the offenders who were referred to TASC (excluding those referred for POM).

Of those offenders participating in TASC, 74% were males and 26% were females.

*These TASC statistics do not include TASC matters that may be pending and have not been marked as completed/successful or completed/unsuccessful.

Adult (Non-Drug) Diversion

The MCAO contracts with three providers for non-drug diversion programs: Sage Counseling, TASC and Community Healthcare Company. These companies provide non-drug diversion programs for offenders who require general “life skills” training, anger management counseling and drug and alcohol awareness assistance.

- 1,467 offenders newly enrolled in MCAO Non-Drug Diversion Programs in FY 2014-15.
- 1,261 offenders completed MCAO Non-Drug Diversion Programs in FY 2014-15.
- 135 offenders were “non-compliant” and did not complete programs in FY 2014-15.

Child Abuse / Excessive Punishment Diversion

The Family Violence Bureau within the MCAO refers certain low level offenses to a child abuse diversion program for parents and guardians. This is available as a charging decision for first-time offenders who use excessive force in disciplining a child that causes only minor injury and are facing a charge of child abuse or a similar offense. If the offenders complete an education and counseling program, they can avoid having charges filed against them.

- In FY 2014-2015, 20 defendants were referred to this diversion program. 11 are still in the program; the MCAO filed criminal charges against 1 and 2 files are currently under review for possible criminal charges. 6 defendants unsuccessfully completed (failed) the program during the reporting period.

Juvenile Diversion

The MCAO uses the Juvenile Probation Department for diversion eligible cases. Juvenile Probation Diversion includes first and second misdemeanors and first-time drug-related offenses. If it is the first or second referral for the juvenile, the County Juvenile Probation Department will handle the diversion process and the referrals will not be prosecuted by the MCAO.

- In FY 2014-2015, there were 9,858 diversion eligible referrals handled by Juvenile Probation. This includes traditional diversion, drug diversion, FINS (Families in Need) and Teen Court. This represents the number of referrals and not the number of youth; as some youth are referred multiple times during the same year.

Felony Pretrial Intervention Program

The Felony Pretrial Intervention Program is an alternative to traditional court prosecution. The program, initiated in July 2015, aims to reduce recidivism by requiring defendants to complete treatment programs that are targeted to their individual needs. Eligibility is determined on a case-by-case, defendant-by-defendant basis. This program is intended for offenders with minimal criminal history who are willing to do the hard work necessary to get back on track and become productive members of our community. Successfully completing the program allows the offender to avoid a felony conviction. We will have FY numbers to report in 2016 when the program has been operational for one full year.

The Maricopa County Attorney's Office continues to provide high-quality, cost-effective diversion programs to eligible adult and juvenile offenders who come in contact with our office.
